Saying Goodbye

a blessing in disguise

Life is filled with goodbyes, some heartfelt and full of emotion, some gutwrenching, some carried out with a minimum of effort or reflection, others even snarky or funny. In the Bible we find examples of necessary goodbyes, as when Abraham, upon the Lord's direction, leaves the Ur of the Chaldees, to travel to a land unknown; David moves away from home and the fields and sheep to play the harp for Saul; many of the prophets abandon the comforts of home to tell God's people to shape up, with hardship generally accompanying the move; an Israelite maiden (Esther), removed from her Jewish way of life, enters the pagan harem of King Xerxes. The list goes on and on, and each of these involves a goodbye.

In the New Testament, in the 14th-17th chapters, John records the farewell discourse of Jesus, when He tells His disciples (*goodbye*) that He will be going to the Father but will send the Holy Spirit to guide them. He commands them to love one another and informs them that the world will hate them.

When Paul sets sail for Jerusalem, in Acts 20 Dr. Luke records the occasion. In a hurry to reach the "holy city," the apostle decides to sail on past Ephesus, but he nevertheless wants to meet with the elders from the Ephesian church. So he asks them to come and meet him in Miletus. After exhorting them to preach boldly and hold fast to the truth, Paul "[kneels] and [prays] with them. They all [cry] as they [embrace] and [kiss] him *good-bye*. They [are] sad most of all because he had said that they [will] never see him again" (36-38a).

So we can affirm, then, that saying goodbye really is commonplace. In our lives it may indicate a simple "See you later," a farewell when we leave work or school for the day, hang up from a phone call, set off on a vacation, a job change requires relocation, or, well—any parting. Even the time of death means a goodbye. As Solomon records in Ecclesiastes 3:1, "There's a time for everything, and a season for every action under heaven..."

Since we often speak the word "goodbye," a brief history lesson here might prove beneficial. The word traces its origin back to the late 16th century, except then it was spelled *godbwye*. What does this interesting and seemingly unpronounceable combination of letters mean? It's the shortened version of *God be with ye* (now written *goodbye*). Stare at it a bit, (godbwye), and you can maybe see *good* is *God*, *ye* (*you*) is at the end, and the rest appears scrambled in between.

Sometimes people who speak other languages find fault with our *goodbye*, because to them the word seems so terminal (when actually, it pronounces a blessing: **God be with you**). Sounding not so final, for example, in German, *auf wiedersehen* expresses *until we see each other again*. Likewise, *hasta la vista* in Spanish basically indicates *see you around*. On the other hand, the Spanish, well-known *adios* literally means *go to God, and the French* adieu *I commend you to God*.

Moreover, our church services conclude with a goodbye, a departing blessing, often the very familiar Aaronic benediction (Numbers 6:24), "The Lord bless you and keep you..." Or, as found In II Corinthians 13:14, the Trinitarian "May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all." Interestingly, the Bible specifically closes with this one: "The grace of the Lord Jesus be with God's people. Amen" (Revelation 22:21).

From the epistles, a modern translation specifically includes our standard "dismissal" word: "Finally, brothers, *good-by*. Aim for perfection, listen to my appeal, be of one mind, live in peace. And the God of love and peace will be with you" (II Corinthians 13:11).

What if the thought of "**God be with you**" is really what our souls need as we face our heart-breaking goodbyes? Even if we can't *say* it to that person, we certainly can *pray* it in our hearts. And...

The next time we bid someone farewell, let's consider sincerely voicing, "God be with you." Or at least think about the fact that we're not indicating a permanent separation but rather commending the other person to the Lord.

Raspberry Fluff

Ingredients

2 small boxes instant cheesecake pudding mix (or white chocolate pudding mix) 3-4 ounces each

32 ounces of strawberry yogurt

16 ounces of whipped topping (Cool Whip) 16 ounces of frozen raspberries or any frozen fruit

Instructions

In a large bowl beat together the dry pudding mix and yogurt. I prefer using an electric mixer for this.

Then fold in the Cool Whip whipped topping. (The lumps go away as you keep folding.) Fold in the frozen raspberries (any frozen fruit will work).

Keep refrigerated.
