A View from the Pew

Reach for a Song

It is good to praise the Lord and Make music to Your Name, O Most High...

An unquestionably particular and genuine richness of Reformed heritage lies in our singing the psalms. While there's nothing inherently "wrong" with contemporary songs, it's those based on scripture (and not mefocused) that prove theologically sound. That said, this "View from the Pew" is not a mini-treatise on the psalter. It is, however, a call to "Sing praises to the Lord, for He has done gloriously; let this be made known in all the earth" (Isaiah 12:5). Additionally, we can recognize that the Lord Himself delights in us and sings songs, too.

Presumably every one of us recognizes the command: "This is the day the Lord has made; let us *rejoice* and be glad in it" (Psalm 118:24). Along this same vein (more commands), "Come, let us *sing* for joy to the Lord; let us *shout aloud* to the Rock of our salvation. Let us *come before Him* with thanksgiving and *extol Him with music and song*" (Psalm 95:1-2).

And not just any song. It needs to pass the litmus (a decisively indicative) test, a three-fold examination. It ought to be a hymn or worship song that raises us "onto a different plane spiritually; it must summon in [us] the emotional wherewithal to remember [our] calling." Second, it should be "filled with deep truths about life and God." Finally, it needs to have "power to press healing and strength into [our] tired heart[s]."*

A peek into God's heart reveals something like this: Sing songs to Me; tell of My wondrous works. Remember that I take great delight in you. Do we doubt the truth of this idea? We shouldn't, because it's right on the printed pages of our Bibles. "The Lord delights in those who fear Him, who put their hope in His unfailing love" (Psalm 147:11). Furthermore, "The Lord your God is with you. He is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, He will quiet you with His love, He will rejoice over you with singing" (Zephaniah 3:17).

Let's consider this last bit: The Lord will "rejoice over you with singing!" Yes, you read that right. Please read it again. *God sings! Over us!*

Therefore, what can we conclude about singing? Definitely, it's Godordained. Even He participates. In fact, according to Hebrews 2:12, we



might say Jesus leads our singing: "For He [Jesus] said to God, 'I will proclaim Your Name to my brothers and sisters. I will praise You among Your assembled people."

To "get definitional" a moment, "to reach" means to extend ourselves, stretch, seize, and grasp. So, today, and every day, let's **reach** for a song. In case we need more reasons, consider these: "When the Colossians were struggling under the madman Nero, Paul ordered, 'Let the message about Christ, in all its richness, fill your lives. Teach and counsel each other with all the wisdom He gives. Sing *psalms and hymns and spiritual songs to God* with thankful hearts'" (Colossians 3:16).*

Can we find further proof? "When the Ephesians were being threatened with torture, Paul told them to encourage one another, 'singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, and making music to the Lord in your hearts" (Ephesians 5:19).*

...to proclaim Your love in the morning and Your faithfulness at night...For You make me glad by Your deeds, O LORD; I sing for joy at the works of your hands. (Psalm 92:1-4)

"Come, let us sing a psalm and drive away the devil," declared Martin Luther. Basically, Satan and his minions loathe our worship songs. The Lord, on the other hand, loves them. So **reach for a song...and... keep singing!**

Jelly Flavored Pops

3 cups blueberries

1 cup strawberries

1 tablespoon vanilla extract

1/2 cup unsweetened rice milk

3/4 cup natural peanut butter

1/3 cup agave nectar

In the cup of a blender, combine blueberries, strawberries, vanilla extract, rice milk, peanut butter and agave nectar. Blend until smooth then pour, dividing equally, into six individual Popsicle molds. Place in the freezer and freeze until solid— about four hours. Approximate servings per recipe: 6
